David Mincberg serves as Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of Flagship Properties Corporation (“FPC”), A Houston based real estate investment firm. He also serves as Managing Partner of Flagship Capital Partners, a real estate finance company. Since 1977, David has been directly involved in the development and construction of over 30,000 multi-family units throughout the states of Texas, New Mexico, Nevada, Louisiana and Georgia. Additionally, Flagship has invested in numerous commercial real estate properties.

Public service and civic involvement has long been a passion for David. He is a past chairman of Harris County Democratic Party, a county wide elected position, serving from 1994-1998. In 2006-2007 he was recruited by Houston Mayor Bill White to serve as the Mayor’s Special Assistant for Multi-Family Housing Policy. In this “Dollar-a-year” position, he coordinated policy and implementation for the three housing agencies of the City of Houston, with a special emphasis on increasing the affordable housing stock in Houston. In July 2009 Mayor White appointed David to the board of commissioners of the Houston Housing Authority, the fourth largest public housing authority in the country, where he served as chair of the board through February 2012.

David currently serves as chair of the board of the Houston First Corporation (“HFC”). HFC is a local government corporation created to promote Houston as a World – Class destination for tourism and conventions as well as operate Houston’s convention and performing arts facilities.

David is a graduate of the University of Texas (BA 1971; JD 1975). Among numerous activities and honors while at the University of Texas, he was the president of the Friar Society, the university’s oldest and highest honorary society, which recognizes students who have made significant contributions and brought honor to the university and the community.

David is married to Lainie Gordon. They are the parents of five children.
