

Interim Dean Dr. Milton greets and thanks Opioid panelist, Ms. Young, TSU Chief of Police, Dr. Angelique Harding, Houston Health Dept., Dr. Juanice Middleton Colwell, Menninger Clinic, Ms. Shannon G. Martin, Drug Enforcement Agency and Mr. Jones, Esq. and Dr. Etes of OET. The panels addressed the following; drug abuse related to opioid analgesics and the trends in medical use and abuse; the risk characteristic of persons dying of unintentional pharmaceutical overdose, types of drugs involved, and the role of drug abuse in the death; the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) plans to require opioid makers to provide training for physicians and patient-education materials on the appropriate prescribing and use of prescription opioid pain relievers and; ways to educate and promote drug abuse awareness at home, on the job, in schools.
