# It's that Time of Year! Social Work Block Application Process

- ⇒ It's the time of year when Junior level students begin the process of applying for Senior level Block. As such, there are a number of steps that must be followed in order to ensure a smooth process.
- ⇒ The Director of Field Education will visit SOCW 340 and 347 classes to discuss field applications — March 2018.
- ⇒ Applications will be distributed during these ⇒ visits. Those absent must obtain one from the Dept.
- $\Rightarrow$  Prior to submitting the application, verify your GPA eligibility (2.30) and compare your transcript to the Social Work Curriculum, You must have completed all courses up through the Junior year, with grades of "C" or above in all Social Work, Sociology and Psychology courses. You must also have completed Statistics by the time Senior Block begins in the Fall.
  - ⇒ Incomplete grades must be removed before applying for Field, regardless of the course.

- ⇒ Placement Application; attach a copy of your transcript and Letter of Acceptance to the program – **REQUIRED.**
- ⇒ A schedule will be placed on Ms. Omorogbe's door (PAB 302AB). At that time, an announcement indicating it is time to sign up for interviews will be sent. It is your responsibility to sign up for a time and to keep your appointment.
- ⇒ Interviews begin in April.

She obtained her Bachelor's Degree in Social Work from Texas Southern University in May 2002 and her Master of Social Work Degree from the University of Houston-Graduate College of Social Work (GCSW) in May 2003. She was awarded an Agencies for Gerontological Intercultural Field Training (AGIFT) Fellowship her senior year at Texas Southern University and maintained her Fellowship throughout graduate school.

Upon graduating from the GCSW, she worked as an Investigator for Children's Protective Services (CPS). After parting from CPS, Roxanne gained employment with Harris County Social Services. In September of 2016, she transitioned from Administrative Social Work to direct services with her current role at HCA's Kingwood Medical Center.
